SUMMARY: The documents below is Alderman Henry Billingsley's 'Certificate for the custom of oils, wools & fruits brought into the Port of London in 3 years ending 9 May 1592', an itemized list of the customs fees paid to the Queen from the following oils, wools and fruits imported into England during the years 1589-1592:

Seville oil the pipe Sweet oil the butt Sweet oil the barrel Train oil [=oil extracted from the carcasses of sea animals] the pipe Linseed oil the barrel

Spanish hatting wool
Spanish clothing wool

Prunes
Figs

The document is endorsed 'Earl of Oxford's suit to her Majesty to bring into the realm oils, wools, fruits'.
