SUMMARY: The document below summarizes a letter written on 16 February 1577 from London by Thomas Screven to Edward Manners (1549–1587), 3<sup>rd</sup> Earl of Rutland, speculating that Oxford's sister, Mary de Vere (d.1624), would marry Gerald Fitzgerald (1559–1580), the eldest son and heir of Gerald Fitzgerald (1525-1585), 11<sup>th</sup> Earl of Kildare, and his wife, Mabel Browne (d.1610), the sister of Anthony Browne (1528-1592), 1<sup>st</sup> Viscount Montague, the father of Mary Browne (d.1607), mother of Henry Wriothesley (1573-1624), 3<sup>rd</sup> Earl of Southampton. Mary de Vere's prospective husband, Gerald Fitzgerald (1559-1580), was thus a first cousin of Southampton's mother, Mary Browne (d.1607). At the time this marriage between Mary de Vere and Edward Fitzgerald was being considered, Mary Browne had already been married for a decade to Henry Wriothesley (1545-1581), 2<sup>nd</sup> Earl of Southampton.

'Lord Garrett' is mentioned as an associate of Oxford's in TNA SP 12/151/46, ff. 103-4.
